That the World May Know: Fire on the Mountain - Session 4: The Mountain of God

Tested and Trained to Be God's Message

Like other people of their time, the Israelites were familiar with the cultural practice of seeking God (or gods) on high places. So they naturally understood that God would call them to mountaintops so that they could worship him and he could teach them. God related to his people through mountain experiences just as he related to them through other familiar cultural icons and practices, such as temple worship, priests, sacrifices, offerings, altars, and prophets.

 We can view the places where God chose to meet with his people during biblical times. And we can learn valuable lessons from what took place.

The Israelites Come to Mount Sinai

Israel arrived at Mount Sinai at the beginning of the third month. They camped at the foot of Mount Sinai for nearly a year as God revealed to them the response he expected of them. They had celebrated him as their king at the Red Sea, and now they needed to learn how to accept his reign as their Lord.

Recognizing the Presence of God

Imagine how the Israelites felt as they prepared for God to come down on Mount Sinai. They had seen God's power in the plagues and had followed his presence in the pillar of cloud and fire. They had been warned about getting too close to Mount Sinai and limits had been placed around the mountain to protect them

Enthroning God as King

God made a covenant with Abraham more than 400 years before Israel stood at Mount Sinai and received his gift of the Torah. He promised Abraham that his descendants would be God's chosen people forever and that he would bless them for Abraham's sake—and bless the entire world through them. God did not demand obedience from the Israelites as a precondition for their redemption from slavery; they were already God's people. He demanded their obedience because the future direction of his kingdom depended on whether or not they would enthrone him as their Lord and King.

 After freeing the Hebrews from Egyptian slavery and providing for Israel in the desert, where did God lead the Israelites? What was his purpose for taking them there? Exodus 19:1 – 6

Moses Kept Climbing the Mountain

When Moses reached Mount Sinai, he was at least 80 years old. He had been a shepherd for 40 years, he had courageously challenged Pharaoh, and he had faced the Israelites' unbelief, anger, rebellion, and fear in the desert. Moses faced new challenges at Mount Sinai, including climbing up and down the mountain multiple times! Notice how much effort Moses put into obeying God.

- As soon as Moses arrived at Mount Sinai, he began the first of many trips up the mountain to meet with God. Remember the video and the scenes of the climb up Jebel Katarina. What does this say about the effort God expects from his people? In what ways must God have provided for Moses? Exodus 19:1 – 6
- 2. Take the time to read the record of Moses' trips up and down Mount Sinai.
