God Prepares His Bride, Israel

If the wedding of God and his bride, Israel, occurred at Mount Sinai, we should expect a time of courtship when God showed himself to be a faithful and loving husband. The prophet Jeremiah reveals when and where that courtship took place: "as a bride you loved me and followed me through the desert, through a land not sown."

 How did God feel as he watched his bride come across the desert and approach the foot of his mountain?

God Places His Chuppah over Israel

In a traditional Jewish wedding, the bride and groom come together under a chuppah (canopy). The chuppah symbolizes the protective covering God provides for the couple as they begin their marriage. This beautiful picture is rooted in the covering of God's presence that he provided when he brought his bride to Mount Sinai.

God Prepares the Ketubah

In ancient times, covenants formally defined many kinds of relationships, including the marriage relationship. Covenants were documented carefully to spell out the mutually agreed upon responsibilities and commitments of the parties involved. The Bible describes Israel as God's bride, so in keeping with the marriage metaphor, the Ten Commandments can be viewed as a ketubah.

The Bride Has an Affair

God continued to love his unfaithful bride. When God came down to the Hebrews, fire, smoke, thunder, and the trembling of the earth beneath their feet filled their senses. Even with all that, they turned their affection toward a golden calf!

- What kind of love did God have for his people? What kind of relationship was he establishing with them at Mount Sinai? Exodus 16:3 – 6 Ezekiel 16:8
- 2. Israel made some specific promises in order to express the love for God and protect the sanctity of their ongoing relationship with him, but quickly reneged when put to the test. Which acts had the Hebrews agreed not to do?

4. When Moses saw the calf and the behavior of the Hebrews, what was his response? Why was it significant? Exodus 32:19 - 30

Celebrate the Covenant

Obedience is the language of love. God deeply loved Israel and delivered his people from bondage to bring them into a personal and intimate relationship with him—their "husband" and King. Obedience was the "love language" by which God wanted his people—his bride—to express their love toward him.

- God made a covenant with Israel that is summarized in the Ten Commandments. On what basis did God give Israel the opportunity to have a covenant relationship of love with him? Deuteronomy 7:6 – 8
