That the World May Know: With All Your Heart - Session 3: He Lead Them like a Shepherd

God Leads like a Shepherd

Through the Spirit-empowered leadership of Moses, God led his chosen people out of the lush, fertile farms of Egypt and into the vast desert wilderness. Even today, the Sinai Desert is a maze of steep rocky mountains, trackless canyons, and sand-choked valleys. It is a threatening world to those who are unfamiliar with it as the Hebrews were. The Hebrews were afraid they would die in the desert. They were totally dependent on both God's provision of manna, quail, and water, and his faithfulness in leading them through the dangerous and unknown land.

1. After the Hebrews marched out of Egypt, God anticipated and met their need for his guiding, protective presence—in much the same way a shepherd would guide a flock. In each of the following passages what specific examples of shepherd-like care did God provide for his people?

God Chooses Moses

When we think about what qualifies a person for leadership, we might list such things as education, the ability to speak well, training, and so on. Moses had qualifications such as these. Moses had spent forty years being a shepherd in the desert through which God wanted him to lead the Hebrews to their new land. God had groomed Moses for this mission.

When Moses met God at Mount Horeb and God explained what he was asking Moses to do, what doubts immediately surfaced in Moses' mind?

Lead as I Lead

The exodus story is the story of two kingdoms, each with a distinct leadership style. Moses grew up in Pharaoh's palace learning a brutal type of leadership. Moses needed to learn a gentler style because that is how God typically leads. Learn how well he learned to lead as the Good Shepherd leads.

- When God first met Moses at the burning bush and commissioned him to speak to Pharaoh and lead the Hebrews out of Egypt, how did Moses respond? Exodus 3:1 – 11

Trust is the Lesson of the Desert

God was moving his people from slavery in Egypt to freedom in the Promised Land. It was not simply a change in locations. When the Hebrews left Egypt, they could not survive, much less thrive, in the desert. Only after learning that God would protect them would they become his priests and witnesses who would display him to other nations.

 God says that he took the Hebrews into the desert to humble them, test them, and know what was in their hearts. God's definition of "test" was proving a person's quality by experience.

The Shepherd Who Would Come After Moses

Moses, the Egyptian prince turned nomadic shepherd, matured to become a great godly leader. He developed an intimate relationship with God, and patiently, lovingly led the Hebrews as they struggled free from their bondage to Egypt and its ways. Although Moses stands out in biblical history as a leader like no other, he still was sinful and could not remove or pardon the Hebrews' sins, much less the sins of all humankind. God would later send the Messiah—the sinless Shepherd—to give the ultimate sacrifice.
