

That The World May Know: Walking With God in the Desert – Session 1: Join the Journey

Living in a World of Chaos

God's story began in Genesis, when the earth was "formless and empty"—the opposite of God. As his Spirit hovered over the watery chaos, God spoke and by the power of his words formed and filled the chaos, imposing beautiful order onto disorder. Everything God created was in perfect harmony (shalom) and he proclaimed that "it was very good."

Two Kinds of Deserts

What comes to mind when you hear the word "desert?" Windswept sand and sun-bleached bones? Cacti? Snakes? Many of us first picture a desert as a physical place. These deserts have boundaries and certain characteristics: water is scarce, there is little vegetation, and daytime heat can be overwhelming.

The Three Lands of the Exodus

The exodus began in Egypt. Egypt is where God's people were not only enslaved physically but had chosen the bondage of trusting in Pharaoh and Egypt's gods to provide security, fertility, food, protection, guidance, and moral standards. In the desert, God joined his people on their journey, gave them his words, established an intimate covenant with them, and provided for their needs.

God Shapes His People in the Desert

The exodus was a pivotal event in the Hebrew's story. Because it occurred in the harsh deserts of the Sinai Peninsula and Israel, desert has played a central role in their religious faith. In God's plan, the harsh desert was a place of training and learning. He led them into the desert knowing they would not survive without his help and then even with his provision life would not be easy.

1. What three key things did God desire his people to discover and learn through their time in the desert?

Returning to the Desert

After Moses died, God used Joshua to lead the Hebrews into the Promised Land, the "good land" they had heard about for so long. They left behind the brutal heat and waterless wasteland of the desert and enjoyed springs of fresh water and the Jordan River flowing through their land. As they took possession of the land, they saw their God stop the Jordan River from flowing, drop Jericho's walls, stop the sun in its path across the sky, and rout entire armies.
